The Importance of Cultural Exchange

The ginkgo trees lining the front walkway of Aoyama Gakuin have finally started to shed their yellow leaves, marking the beginning of winter in Tokyo. I have now been living in Japan for over three months, but it feels like no time has passed at all. I thought I would be used to living here by now, but every day I discover new places, meet new people, and learn new things about the Japanese culture and language. Every moment here has helped me to grow as a person, but having the opportunity to meet and talk with the local people has been the most valuable part of my study abroad experience.
