The second change of name from McMinnville College to Linfield College was announced on Jan. 10, 1922. Linfield is named after George Fisher Linfield, a Baptist minister born on the East Coast who spent the bulk of his life in the Midwest. George and his wife, Frances (Ross) Linfield, pledged to spend their life savings on the advancement of Christian education, and invested in real estate. After George's death in 1890 at age 44, Frances moved to the Northwest, became a Linfield Trustee, Dean of Women and friend to president Leonard Riley. She donated \$250,000 of Spokane real estate in 1922 (\$3.5 million today), asking that the school be renamed in honor of her late husband.

Dr. Peter Richardson (Linfield 1980-2018) taught German and languages at Linfield College for 38 years and was named Oregon's 2009 Professor of the Year. Special interests included spending a month each summer transcribing historic documents in a private collection of a village in the Swiss Alps and hosting total immersion German weekends for students in the Lincabin near Sisters, Oregon. He was known for a wooden rocking chair in his office where students sat as they got his advice on school and life

Dr. Jane Claire Dirks-Edmunds "In Memory of Dr. Jane Claire Dirks Edmunds '37 Professor of Biology 1941-1976 Scholar, Teacher, Mentor, Friend Ecologist"

Dr. Jane Claire Dirks-Edmunds (1912-2003) '37 was an ecologist, biologist, author, and taught at Linfield from 1946-1974. She studied and wrote about the Saddleback Mountain research site in western Oregon from 1934-1969. Her mentor, Dr. James McNab, employed the comprehensive "aspection" method of recording and identifying every organism, feature and temperatures found year-round on 2.5 acres of Douglas fir and Hemlock forest (which no longer exists as old growth). Jane wrote *Not Just Trees*, published in 1999, about this ecological community from 1933 to 1995.

Leonard W. Riley, 1872-1945 and Julia Pearce Riley, 1870-1956. Riley was the third Linfield president from 1906-1931. His ashes and those of his wife are interred at this site—the only gravesite on Linfield campus. Riley rescued the college from closure with aggressive fund raising, changes to policies and curriculum, and new buildings which carried Linfield through World War I and the Depression. He is also known for eliminating football in 1906, equating it to a street brawl, and then restoring it in 1922 on the same day McMinnville College was renamed Linfield College.

Dr. Doug Cruikshank (Linfield 1978-2001) taught in the Education department specializing in mathematics, retiring as Professor Emeritus. Starting in 1981, Cruikshank and Dr. Drannan Hamby led more than 200 students into the winter backcountry of Oregon for a January term class for 15 years. Cruikshank's book *Between Me and Comfort: A Memoir of the Winter Backcountry*" recalls these experiences. Following retirement, he spent 17 years working with Habitat for Humanity in McMinnville.

Winthrop W. "Win" Dolan (1909-2009) came to Linfield in 1941 as professor of mathematics and dean of academic administration. He served in various administrative capacities, as well as acting President twice. He published *A Choice of Sundials* (1975) and served as college Trustee from 1974-1989. The stainless steel and copper sundial was designed by professor of art Nils Lou.

Harry L. Boardman (Linfield 1896-1903) was the first president of the renamed "McMinnville College" (previously Baptist College) and a faculty member. In addition to his presidential duties, Boardman taught up to 15 classes per year in Greek, Caesar, Latin, Biblical Literature, and Greek philosophers and warned that he was "not well adapted to the work of fund raising". In 1903, he resigned to return to Ohio.

The election of an annual May Queen and royal court at Linfield began in 1904 and continued every year through 1969. Preceding the May Day festivities on the first Saturday in May, all students were enlisted to clean and improve the campus—or be fined for not participating. The adjacent grove of dogwood trees were planted each year to honor the Queens but later thinned as the trees outgrew the space. This erratic rock is one of two identified on campus. The second is in the flower bed across from Ford Theater.

Dr. Ralph E. Storey (Linfield 1899-1904; 1928-1948) graduated from McMinnville College in 1895 and taught in the English department, retiring with Emeritus status. Storey also served as the "May Queen's Bard" for 20 years to offer poems in her honor. In 1943 he proposed to the McMinnville Garden Club (men were also members then) that a dogwood tree be planted for each previous Linfield May Queen back to 1904. Storey passed the idea on to Steve Thomas, below.

Steve died from injuries sustained in a fall on October 18, 1977 while pruning a maple tree between Pioneer and Whitman halls.



Ted R. Wilson, 1919-1996, coached Linfield basketball from 1951 to 1981 compiling a 324-213 winning record with 10 conference titles, earning induction into the NAIA District II Hall of Fame. In 1989 the gymnasium was named for Wilson. On May 10, 1996, he suffered a heart attack while playing handball on campus and died shortly thereafter.




