From the Business Manager

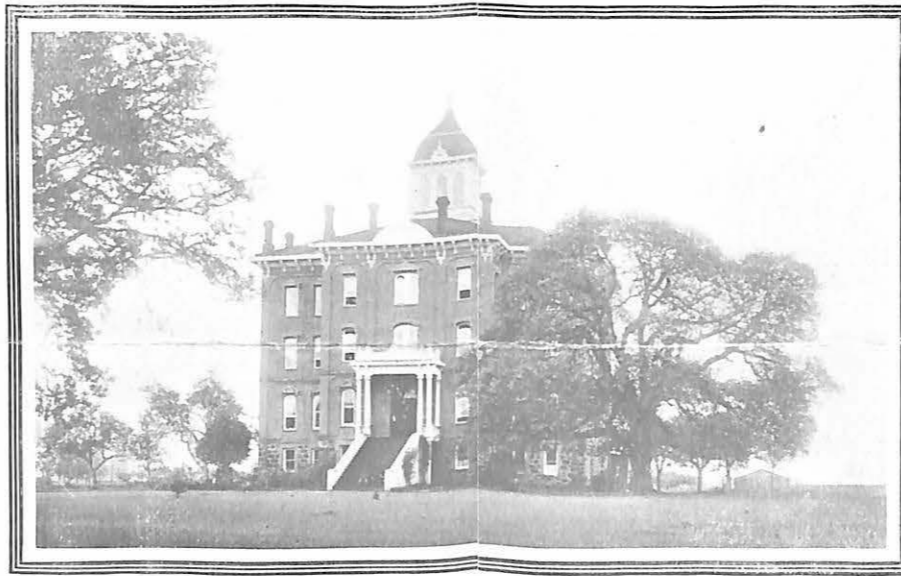

Get Your Student Body Ticket

In nearly all of the colleges and universities of the United States the students are compelled to pay large fees and assessments. In the majority of the higher institutions of learning the students are required to pay large student body fee upon registration, imposed upon them by the student body itself. McMinnville College prides itself upon

this fact, among other things, that this is not true of this institution of learning. While there are fees charged, of course, they are not excessive, but they are as low as they can possibly be and be within the limits of reason. This is in accord with the general spirit of the institution.

It is the custom of most institutions to require a student body fee of from three to five dollars or more each semester which must be paid by each student before he or she can register. For this amount the student usually receives in return a ticket giving free admittance to all the regular activities supported by the student body and various other privileges. By this means only is the support of all the college activities by the entire student body secured. The success of this system can be judged by its popularity.

McMinnville College is a school peculiar to itself, hence its system of student support of student body activities is different from most institutions. There is only a very small compulsory student body fee of seventy five cents which is paid to the treasurer as one-half of the one dollar and a half incidental fee each semester. In addition to this each student is given the opportunity and is expected to secure for himself or herself a student body ticket similar to that of the other institutions and giving the same privileges. In accordance with the McMinnville spirit the student body fee for this ticket is only one dollar and twenty-five cents, or one dollar and fifty cents when paid later. The system is the same as that of other colleges but the assessment is much less.

The advantages of securing one of these tickets can hardly be overestimated. For it the student secures admission to the following: five or six intercollegiate basketball games, which would be twenty-five cents each, the same number of baseball games and the same number of track meets at the same admission fee, several good tennis matches, all the oratorical contests and debates, and a subscription to the college paper, "The Review" the price of which is a dollar per year and which every student should have.

All this is merely viewing it from the monetary side. On the other hand the loyalty to the school and college spirit should compel every student or prospective student to secure one of these tickets upon registration day. You will not regret it but will congratulate yourself many times before the year is over if you do this. You will not only gain
