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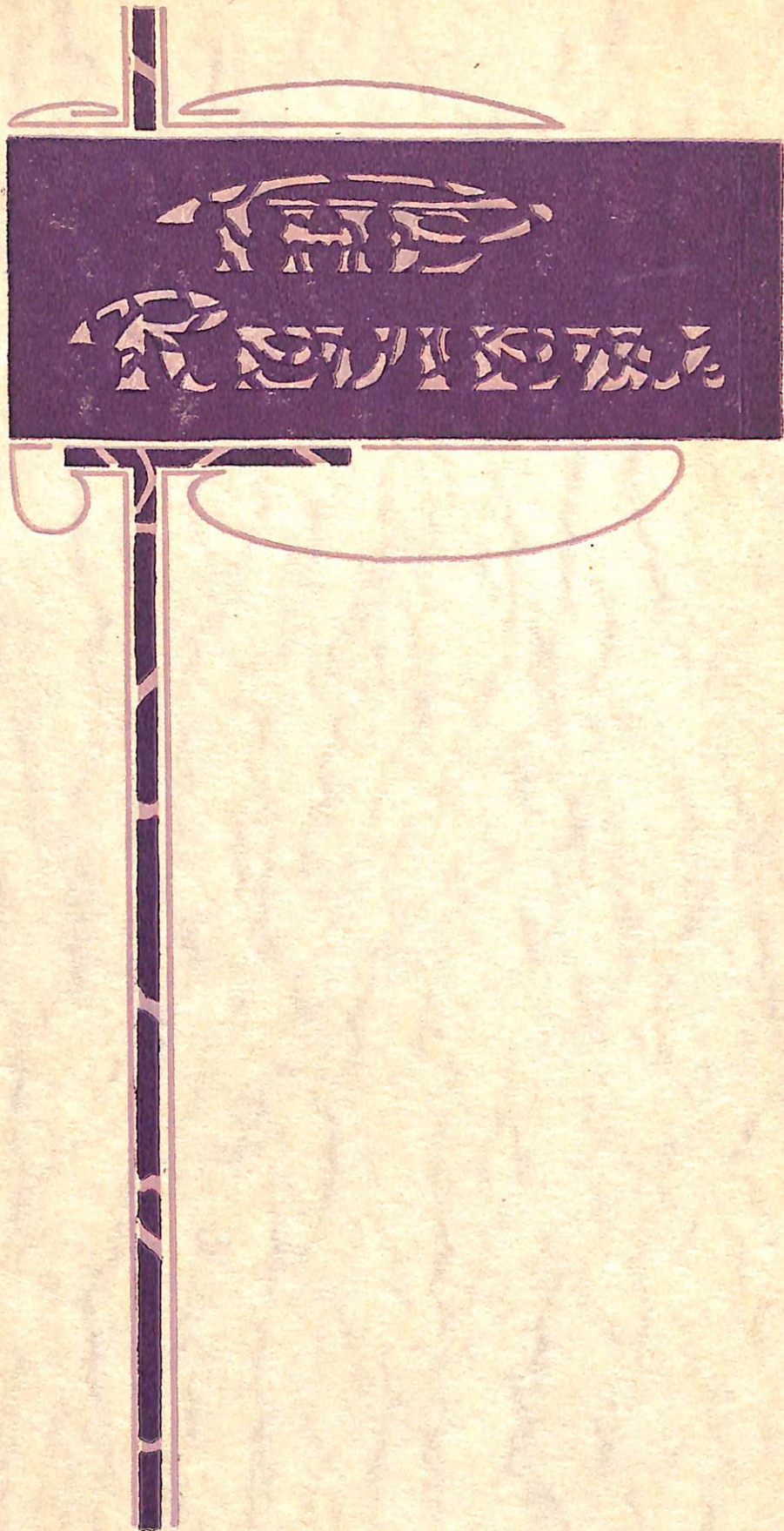

The Associated Student Body of McMinnville College is the biggest fact on the campus; not only because it includes every student and member of the faculty, but because it is the focal point of interest, enthusiasm and activity. The new student soon discovers that the "A. S. B." of which he is a member, is a really live organization; that its activities are many; that its meetings are interesting; that its privileges are a distinct benefit and that on the whole it is something worthy of his support.

The Associated Student Body has a splendid organization and is democratic. Responsibility is well defined. Efficiency is sought and attained in every line of activity. To secure efficiency certain duties are delegated to representative bodies, yet the student body is itself the final authority. The officers of the Association are nominated by direct primary and are thus the choice of the majority, which is the rule of democracy. The expenditure and control of funds is delegated to The Executive Board which is a responsible and representative body. The Executive Board also chooses the managers of the various student body activities from nominees named by the presidents of the classes and by the entire student body. Thus in its organic structure it is a complex yet highly efficient organization.

The Preamble to the Constitution of the Associated Student Body states clearly and briefly the true function of the organization. "For the furtherance of the interests of the student body, and for the promotion and general control of all student activities, and to be the regular and legal means of communication between the student body and the college authorities, and between the student body and other organizations; we, the students of McMinnville College, form an association to be known as The Associated Student Body of McMinnville College." In other words, as an organization we mean business.

The extent of this business may be appreciated as you turn the pages of this Review. The activities of McMinnville College are many and involve the expenditure of considerable time and money. Valuable training is afforded and a splendid opportunity exists for developing executive ability.

Interesting? Attendance is a fair index of the interest of the members of any organization and on that basis the A. S. B. of McMinnville College has few equals. Over ninety per cent. of the members of the A. S. B. remain when Student Body meeting is announced. In fact, it is accepted as custom or tradition and "everybody stays." During the past year student body meetings have been quiet yet interesting. "Pep" has not been lacking and humor has found its place. Last year the prolonged and heated controversy over the question of changing the college colors made things exciting as well as interesting. Altho nothing so drastic has been promulgated this year, we have not lacked snap and ginger.

The new student soon finds that the decisions of the A. S. B. mean something. One of the finest demonstrations of student body loyalty and spirit was the voluntary assuming of an assessment to make Spring athletics possible and to pay a share of the cost of the Commencement Review. That assessment was paid, which means that the word of the Student Body has value. Earlier in the year the A. S. B. voted to send a delegate to Northfield, Mass. No sooner said than done; the money was raised. Truly the decision of the Student Body means something.

The privileges which the student derives from the various activities of the A. S. B. are worth while. The Review fills a big place in student life. The Lyceum is instructive as well as enjoyable. Athletic contests occupy an exceedingly important place in student life. Oratory and Music give profit and pleasure. Every part of student body activity is important. Indeed no person can go thru McMinnville College without soon realizing that the Associated Student Body is by all means an organization worth while.

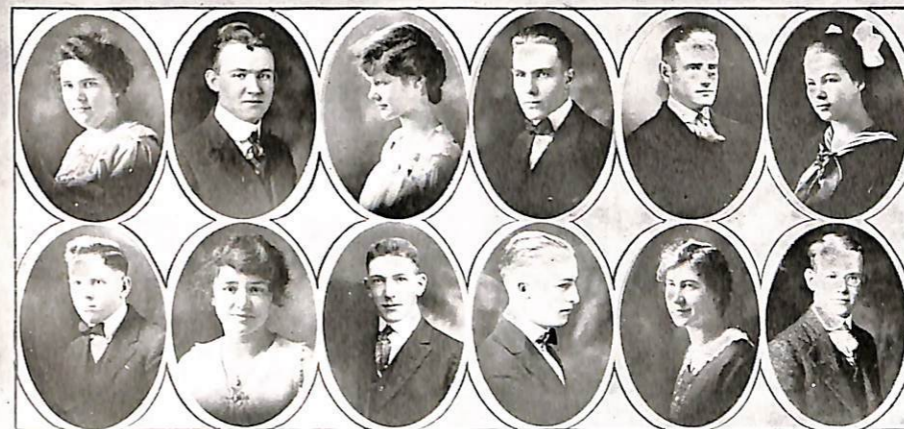
Graduating Class

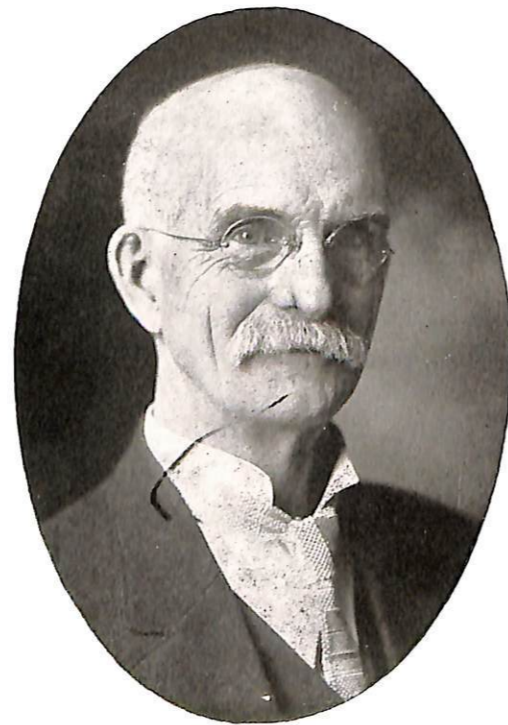

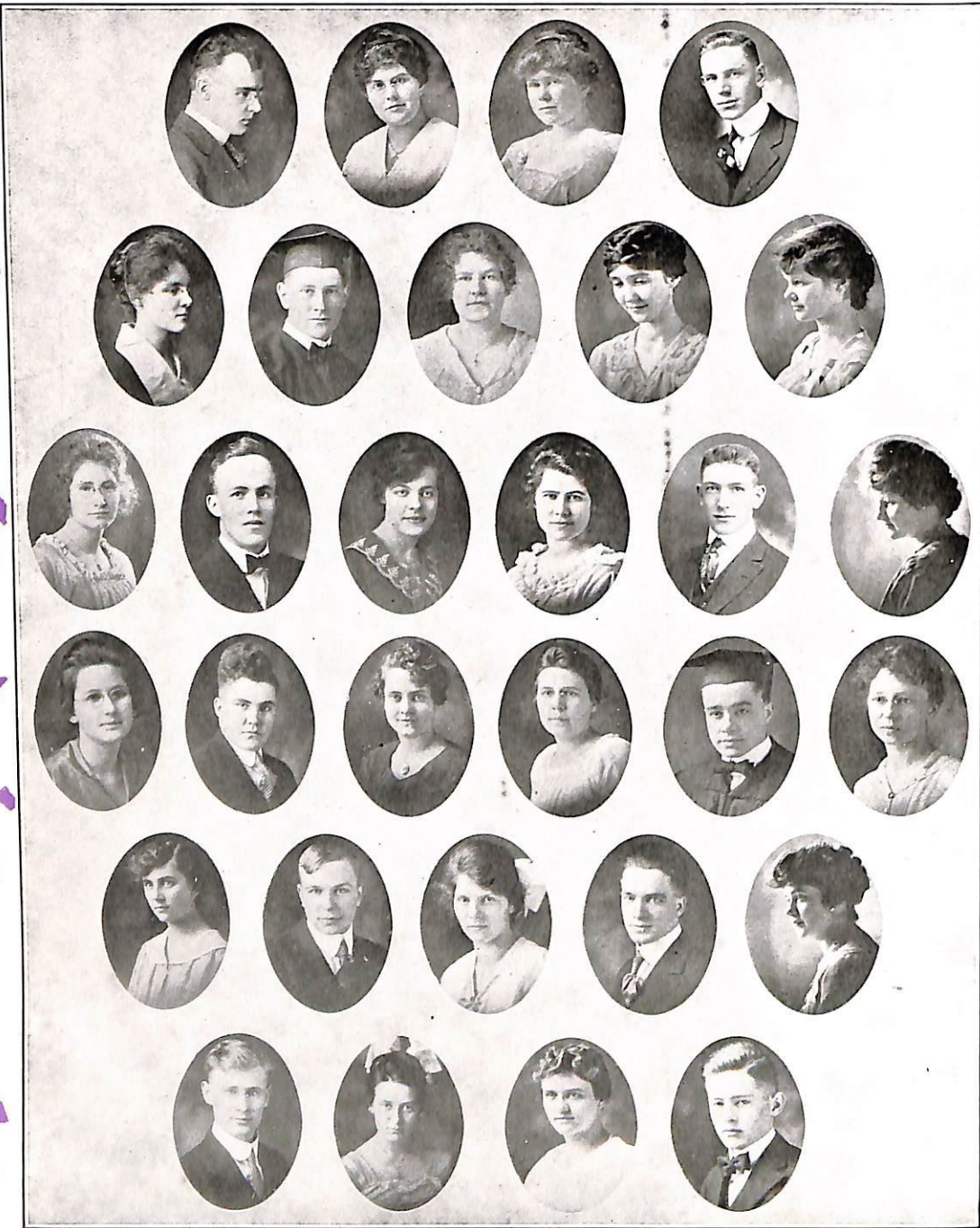

Women's Glee Club

As the war has affected the other departments of the college it has affected the Conservatory department. In former years McMinnville College was known up and down the Willamette valley not only for its orators, student volunteers, Y. W. C. A. and Y. M. C. A. workers and athletes, but also for its Men's Glee Club and Male Quartet. This year however the war had called a large number of the best singers and the conservatory was not able to send out a Men's Glee Club or Quartet.

A number of new students have been enrolled in this department and as the numbers have increased so the efficiency has increased. In order to keep the work at the highest possible standard Mrs. M. D. Warren was added to the faculty to assist Mrs. Potter in the voice department. Miss Audrey Dielschneider has assisted Miss Lawrence in piano. Both Mrs. Warren and Miss Dielschneider are graduates from McMinnville Conservatory. Their services have been greatly appreciated by those under their direction. As the past years of the conservatory are reviewed and the advancement in every way noted, credit should be given to "Mother" C. C. Potter, Dean of the Conservatory and director in voice, and to Miss Jane Lawrence, director in piano. It is with deepest regret that the College gives up Miss Lawrence to her future work in China.

One of the best Women's Glee Clubs has been formed this year, being well balanced with both high and low voices. The Glee Club has appeared a large number of times during the year. Mrs. Potter trained the girls to be ready at any time to present pleasing numbers. This fact has been known to the people of the city and the Women's Glee Club has appeared in practically all the large gatherings during the year, in the patriotic and religious as well as social meetings of the city. This work has given the girls excellent training for a well rounded musical education.

A great deal of time and care was put upon the playlet presented by the Glee Club on May Day. The girls, dressed in old fashioned costumes, presented a scene of the Soldier's Aid Society at the time of the Civil War. Queer bits of news and good humor were brought in with the old fashioned and patriotic songs. Two other numbers were also presented. Both were patriotic. In one the girls appeared in Red Cross costumes.

The Women's Glee Club was greatly appreciated at Commencement time also. It is a fact proudly held by the college that the music of McMinnville College is one of the greatest attractions. The Conservatory furnishes music for the churches of the city, in this way benefiting the student and giving pleasure to others.

There are many advantages to be obtained at the typical small college which it is impossible to secure at the great institutions of higher learning in our country. Educators and men of experience everywhere are commending the small school and the small school student. Close fellowship of students, and friendship between students and faculty build many elements into the character of the small college man and woman which are of lasting value to them in the long race. The democratic spirit so common in smaller schools and the excellent opportunities for leadership and individual development are factors taken for granted in "Old Mac."

Small colleges are frequently subjected to the criticism that they are provincial and narrow in their ideas and teaching. That the attempt to keep the world outlook in McMinnville college has been successful during the year 1917-18 is proven by the responses of the students to various calls which have come from outside the small college circle.

In the fall when the Y. M. C. A. was making its canvass of the colleges of our country for the Student Friendship Fund for army Y. M. and Y. W. C. A. work, Gale Seaman, Student Secretary for the Pacific Coast, came to McMinnville asking "Old Mac" to set the pace for Oregon. If McMinnville students had been a provincial and self-centered lot would a student secretary have called on them to start such a campaign in the state? Former generations of McMinnville students have given those at present allied with the institution a wide awake program to follow. This year with one hundred eighty-nine students and her faculty "Old Mac" went over the top with a subscription of nineteen hundred dollars. Gale Seaman has since said he estimated that McMinnville by her example had raised twenty-five thousand dollars for the Y. M. C. A. fund.

In the month of December another call came. Would McMinnville send a delegate to the special conference of Student Volunteers, War Workers, and Y. M. and Y. W. C. A. Workers at Northfield, Mass? Oregon had the privilege of sending two delegates; McMinnville was to send one of these. Beulah Kenyon, a popular student and a student volunteer, was selected as the unanimous choice of the student body who helped finance her trip. She was the only delegate present from Oregon. Great good has come from Mrs. Kenyon's trip to the conference. Her messages from Northfield have been an added impetus to activities in mission and Bible classes thruout the state. As a result of her trip, her sister, Miss Jane Lawrence who has been a member of the faculty for four years, will leave next fall for South China where she will have charge of music in a girl's school.

During the Red Cross drive in December one hundred students enrolled as members of the Red Cross. An auxiliary was organized at the college and several benefits were given during the year. The first of these was directed by the girls of Kappa Alpha Phi. Another was given on May Day when the Women's Glee Club cooperated with over a hundred of the students in presenting a concert and pageant. The auxiliary has purchased supplies which the college girls have used in their work. In April the student Y. W. C. A. conducted the drive for War Savings Stamps among the students with good results.

Another proof of the broad interest of students of "Old Mac" lies in the way she sends delegations to the various contests and conferences during the year. McMinnville was well represented at all such intercollegiate affairs this year and she always is. With the attendance of the past year almost as good as in previous years, there has been a keen appreciation of the needs of the nation and the men and women have held themselves in readiness to respond to the call of country wherever she could best use them. This has resulted in a better grade of work on the average in spite of the exciting spirit of war with its strong attractions for red-blooded men and women. Many of our boys are in the service now and many more will don the uniform before another academic year opens for their college under the peaceful oaks. McMinnville college with all her powers stands ready to do its utmost for country and for freedom.

So it is with minds open to the questions of the day and sympathies expanding to meet world needs, that students of "Old Mac" are escaping provincialism of interest and action. Equipped with added advantages of the small college of genuine Christian type, McMinnville students are going out to serve.

At the end of this year 1917-18 we wish you the satisfaction of a year well spent. May you recall thru these pages pleasant associations and happy experiences.

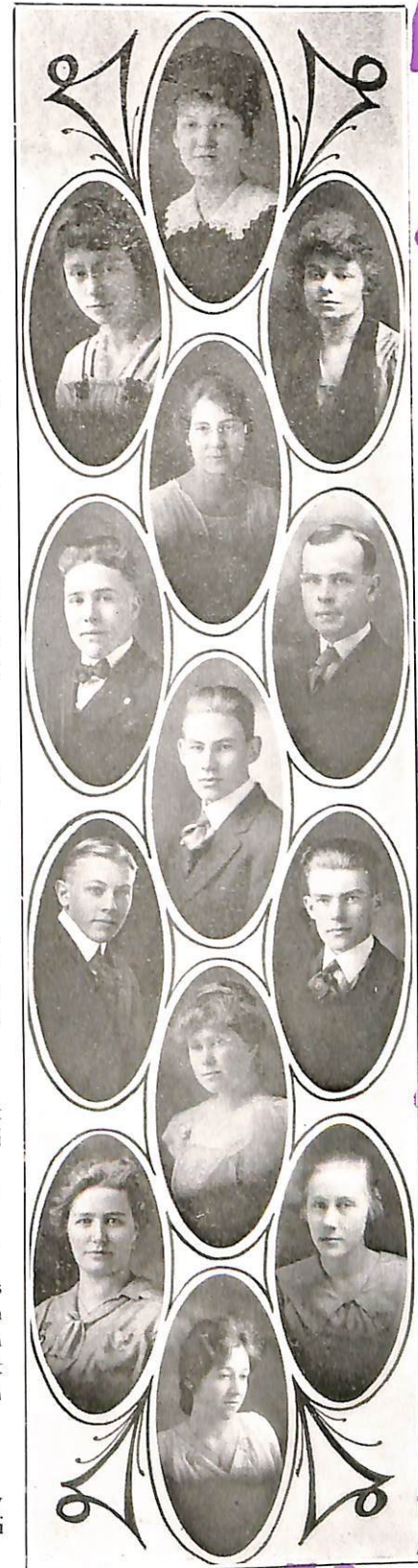

Student Activities

Among the major activities of McMinnville students the following deserve particular mention. Athletics form an important part of student body functions. They not only serve as a means of recreation and development for those who take part, but they create a healthful, vigorous competitive spirit among the students, thus inspiring them to greater self realization not only as organizations for the promotion of winning teams or the seizing of Student Body honors, but also as individual students, as real leaders and as true men and women. Intercollegiate athletics create mutual interests and purposes between every element in the Student Body, teach the students team work, and bind them together with bands of devotion for each other and for their Alma Mater as nothing else can do. They also broaden the college life of every school involved and bear the fruits of better self mastery, deeper knowledge of human nature and a mutual ambition to produce the best type of citizens and leaders. The past year has once more proved Old Mac's allegiance to true sportsmanship in all lines of athletics. Crippled the college has been by the fact that many of her best athletes have joined the colors. Thru hard training those that remained have once more "carried on" to enviable success.

Oratory, so essential to the citizens and leaders of a democratic government, has always held an important place among Student Body activities. This year realizing its exceptional importance in the face of this World War the students have come out for oratory as never before. Just as long as personality is the most powerful force in the world for influencing men to action, public speaking in its various forms will be imperative to every democratic nation on the face of the globe. Eight contestants volunteered for the Old Line Contest. Each spoke with a burning realization of national and international needs. Irl McSherry won first place with Fred Parkes a close second. McSherry took third honors in the State Contest. The Prohibition Contest had ten eloquent contestants. For over two hours they held the audience almost spellbound, while they hung "Old John Barleycorn" and "Kaiser Bill" with the same rope. Fred Parkes captured first place. Ruth Cabeen and Irl McSherry tied for second honors. Parkes took fourth place in the State Contest.

The big Red Cross drive throughout the United States struck home with the McMinnville College students. After a large number of them had been enrolled in the Red Cross they met and organized a college auxiliary, which has accomplished a great deal for the cause in the way of knitting, doing hand sewing and making surgical dressings. The college girls have knitted large bunches of sweaters, socks, scarfs, and mittens; made a great number of handy bags and mending outfits and attended the city auxiliary's surgical dressing classes in good numbers. The material for this work is obtained through the local city auxiliary who have a very complimentary word to say for the splendid class of work done by the college girls.

May Day eve a very patriotic and inspiring pageant of national reputation, called "The Drawing of the Sword," was staged for the benefit of the Red Cross under the auspices of the College Red Cross auxiliary. This pageant contains more than one hundred characters and is one of the biggest and best benefit drawing cards possessed by the Red Cross. It pictures with magnificent dramatic effect the trial of Prussianism before the supreme judges of Liberty, Justice and Truth.

The Lyceum is a series of six or more high class entertainments which are brought to McMinnville each year by the Associated Student Body of McMinnville College. During the season of 1917-18 McMinnville enjoyed an exceptionally good course. Although it was time the Lyceum manager's plans had been made before Kenneth Campbell was given command, he threw every faculty he could muster into the task. In turn the Y. M. C. A. and Liberty Loan campaigns, the Red Cross Drive and finally the War Tax reared up like apparently impenetrable barriers to the Lyceum's success; but by good management and oceans of hard work, Mr. Campbell piloted the course over the top to complete success.

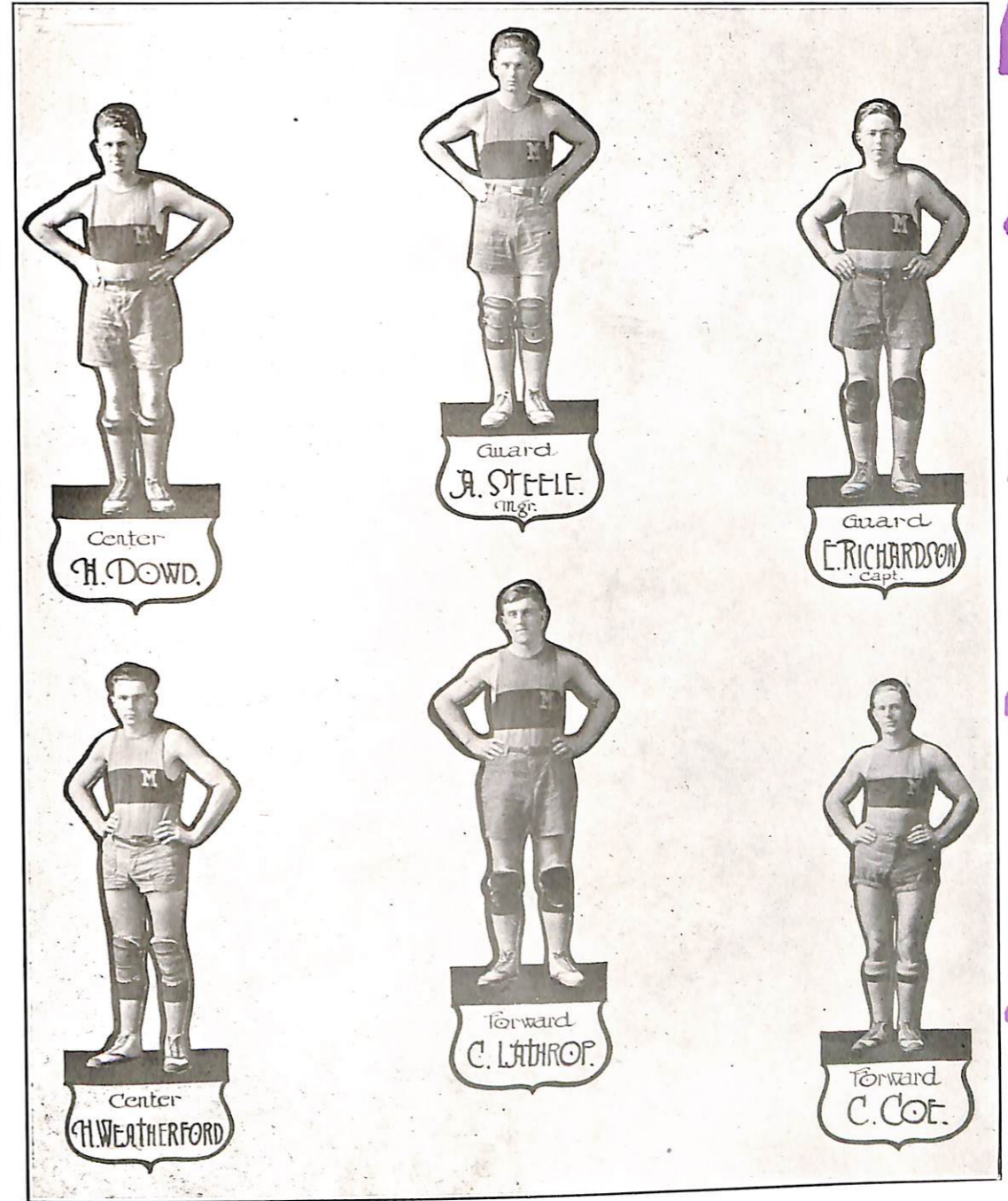

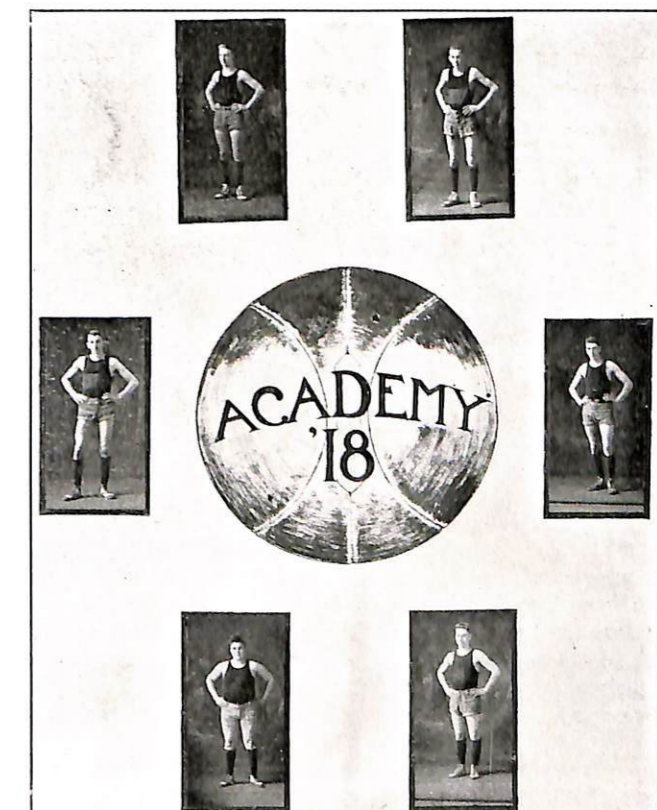
Tennis

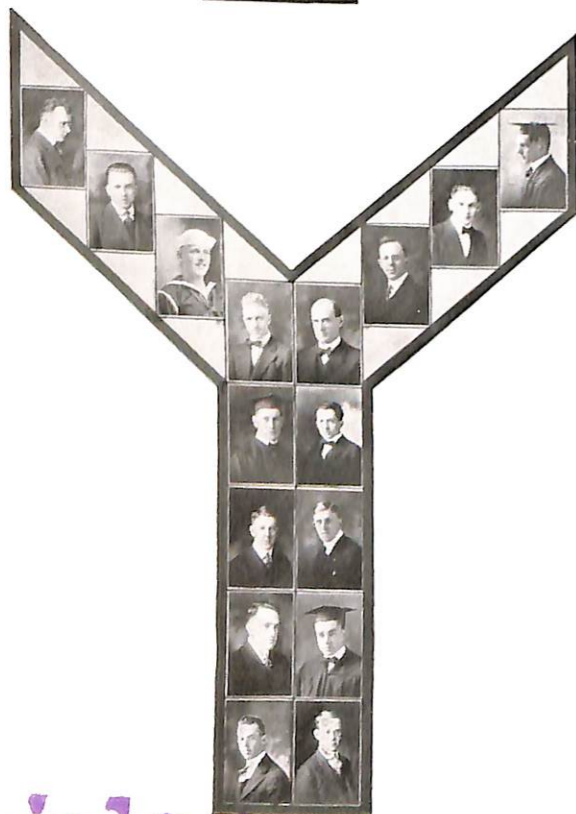


Y. W. C. A.

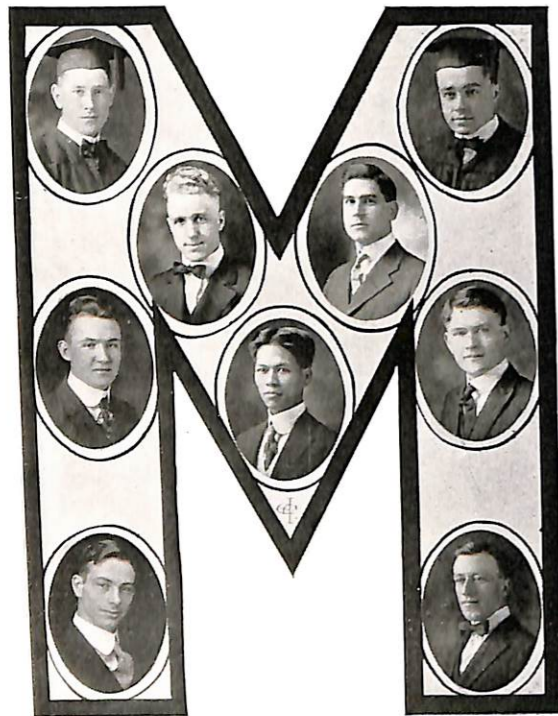

My work is, and always will be just as good as I know how to make it. I must give satisfaction in order that my business may grow.

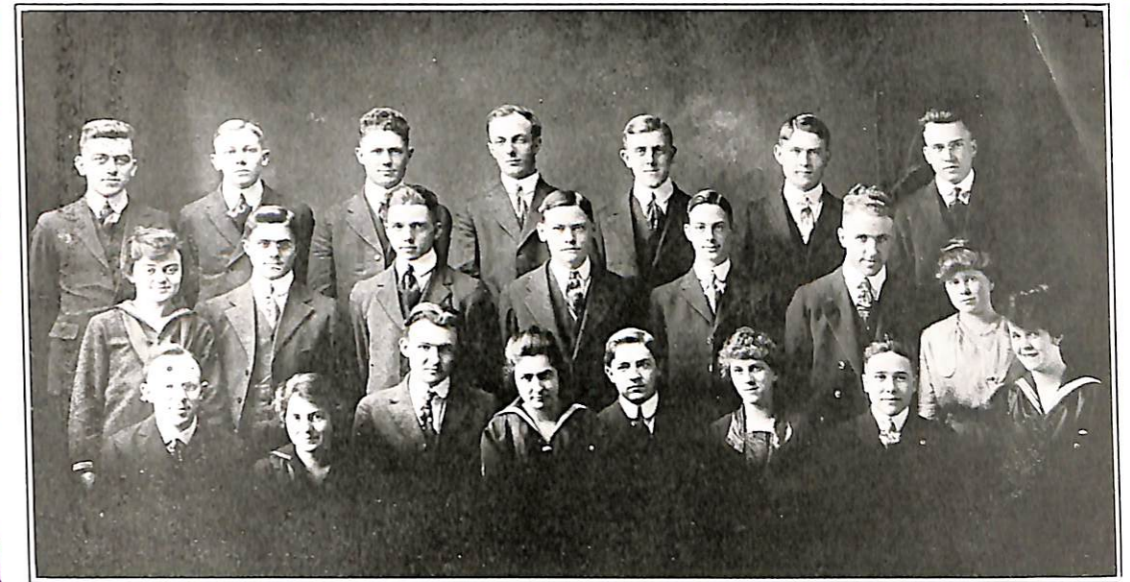
