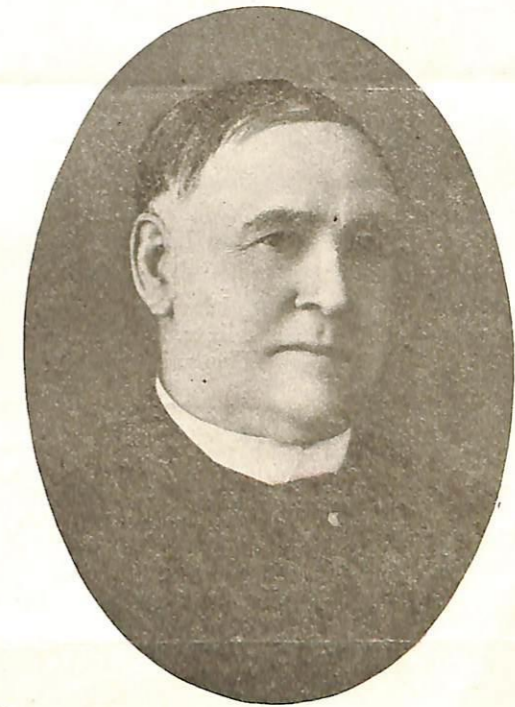
TO YOU--AND YOU!

5. See Prof. E. Northup, who will write on your card all fees.

6. See Treasurer, Mr. C. H. Kopf, and pay all bills.

7. Present the stub returned to you at your first appearance in each class otherwise you will be graded zero.

Do not omit or postpone any one of these steps.
