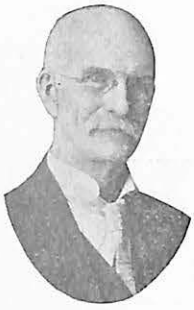

#### After Registration

After registration you will need your books so that you can prepare for the Thursday classes. You will find them at the Book Store, in the hall to your left as you leave the chapel. If you will show the Book store manager your registration stub he will tell you what books you need and furnish you with them.

The College Book store—"The Students Store"—is a Y. M. C. A. activity operated by a student as manager. The store accommodates students by supplying text books, stationery, athletic goods, pennants and pillows, fountain pens, college jewelry and music. Goods which are not on hand can be supplied at a few days notice from Portland or Seattle at no extra charge to you.

Since the Book store is operated solely for the students the service which it is able to give depends on the amount of support given it by the

students. The biggest year in the history of the College is at hand. It should be—and will be—the biggest year in the history of the Book store. But its success depends on student support. It will pay you to use the store for by using it you will increase its usefulness to you.

Text-books are sold at the store on a strictly cash basis. For your convenience credit will be extended on stationery and novelties. Bills will be presented at the end of each month and must be paid promptly.

The music used in the Conservatory of Music is handled thru the Store. The music being furnished by the instructors and payment for it being made to the Book store on presentation of a monthly statement.

You will find all the note books, theme tablets, and other paper which you will need at the Book store. The manager keeps in touch with the faculty and has on hand the things which they require for class and laboratory work.

One of the nicest things for the college student is the "Old Mac" stationery. This is a high grade of correspondence paper embossed with the college seal. There are two styles—Linen and Vellum—each packed in a neat box with envelopes.

Among the other things which you will find at "The Students Store" are Moore Self-filling Fountain Pens—which many Mac students have found very satisfactory for college work. Ink, postage stamps, watch fobs, college seal pins, student laundry bags, pennants, and pillows, and other college novelties. If there is anything that you need that is not here the manager will be glad to get it and if there is any suggestion as to the service which the store gives which may occur to you the manager will be glad to hear of it. Your support and cooperation during the coming year means a successful, practical Book store as one of our college activities.
