## SOPHS AND FROSH ENJOY BIG WEEK

BOTH CLASSES STAGE NOVEL STUNTS IN ASSEMBLY

### Frosh Victorious in Annual Bag Rush

The past week has been filled with thrilling experiences for both the Sophs and the Frosh. According to custom the Sophs made their initial appearance in Student Assembly last Tuesday. The class demonstrated the old pep and spirit that characterized the Frosh of last year.

As soon as President Whitman had assumed charge of the meeting all Sophs left the assembly and retired to the main hall. In a few moments they returned flaunting the cardinal and the gray and marched to the platform in a manner that would have caused the timid to quake. The Frosh were asked to rise and President Bliss of the Sophs read the ultimatum to the Frosh in which he clearly and explicitly laid down the laws that shall govern Frosh conduct on the campus. President Proffitt of the Frosh class came forward to receive the ultimatum after which the class were permitted to be seated.

The Sophs sang their class song and the boys donned the black derby that shall henceforth characterize them on the campus.

On Wednesday morning the Frosh flag proudly floated from the top of the light pole on the middle of the campus on which had been mounted a Soph derby. The clash came during the breakfast hour but the Frosh managed to control the situation and save the flag. Quietness reigned for the remainder of the day. That evening, however, some of the Frosh met with ill fortune at the hands of the Sophs and on Wednesday morning at the hour of seven-thirty there was established on the campus in front of the main building one of the largest and fastest hair-cutting parlors ever known in McMinnville. The Frosh unexpectedly took the Sophs into camp and retaliated the acts of the previous evening. Class enthusiasm ran rampant during the day as one by one the Sophs made their appearance on the campus, having found it necessary to visit the barbers in the city.

The crowning event of Frosh victories came at 4:30 Thursday afternoon, when they easily defeated the Sophs in the Annual Bag Rush. Altho the weather was decidedly wet and unpleasant a large and enthusiastic bunch of rooters supported each their team. The teams were well matched physically and it was anybody's victory until the struggle began. Never was better rooting heard on the field and men more eager to clash.

All was in readiness and the pistol cracked out the GO. The Frosh seem-

### President's Home Scene of Mirth and Gayety

The spacious parlors of the President's home were the scene of the first social gathering of the faculty on Tuesday evening, September 28. The occasion was in honor of Doctor and Mrs. Myron W. Haynes, who have recently moved to McMinnville as their permanent home. Mrs. Riley and Mrs. Potter as hostesses received the guests. Among these were besides the professors, the ladies of their homes, as well as a number of the local members of the board of trustees and their wives, and some other friends. When all the guests had arrived Miss Corbett delighted them with the rendition of several piano selections, among them "A Sunset in a Japanese Garden" and "The Woodnymph." The latter was dedicated to Miss Corbett by her Boston teacher. Thereupon Mrs. Potter called upon Doctor Haynes to "say anything he wished." He responded by expressing his happiness to the once more in McMinnville in the interests of the institution which he learned to admire during his former connection with it. He pronounced it as his conviction that the small college has an important place in the educational and denominational world, and he hoped that McMinnville College would continue to be known for the quality of its work and its spiritual atmosphere rather than to have a large student body. Referring to one of the great state universities of the Middle West he said that of its tens of thousands graduates only thirty-nine had entered the greatest of callings, that of pastoral and missionary work, while McMinnville College with a few hundred graduates had sent out about the same number of ministers and missionaries, not to mention the many who are serving the kingdom outside the active ministry. At the close of his brief talk Doctor Haynes suggested that all present participate in a "good old mixer" in order to get better acquainted. This proposal was carried out without delay and soon all were busily engaged in swapping stories, telling about vacation experiences and commenting on the best student body ever seen on the campus of McMinnville College. As a pleasant conclusion of the evening the young ladies of the Riley household served the guests with delicious ice cream and cake. The occasion will long be remembered as one of the most delightful experienced by the personnel of the college.

## It Pays to Advertise

The question that confronts the business man is: Does it pay to advertise my business? The firm that is progressive and doing business runs an Ad in the paper. They keep their business before the eyes of the public to let them know that they have good wares for sale.

Like the business firm, every student in college is an advertisement of himself. The question is, how and what have you to advertise? Your personality is your shop window and the things that you hang in your shop window are the things that advertise your business, viz., yourself.

What have you in your window? Is it representative of your real self? Some folks make a grand display of pep, scholarship, friendliness, etiquette and a host of other good commodities. But it is simply an outward exhibit that attracts other people, and when some one gets real well acquainted with that individual, he enters his store, so to speak, and is disappointed. He finds that the person does not have those things which are displayed in his personality. He naturally concludes that the window exhibit is simply a matter of camouflage. What's the matter? It is simply a case of fake advertising. He hasn't the goods to deliver, although, by his bearing, he indicates that he has.

How you advertise is equally as important as what you advertise. Right on this point many a good student meets his Waterloo. Some student comes to Mac who has been a big leader in his home town High school. Maybe the person has been president of the Student Body and has played on the baseball and football teams. He may have a talent for music and can play an instrument. Many times such a fellow feels like he ought to fit right into a place of leadership. He runs a heavy "ad" by parading to his fellow students these things. The result is, that nearly every time he is prevented

from filling a place of leadership as soon as he might have otherwise.

On the other hand, some people are misjudged because their window display does not do them justice. There is some idiosyncrasy or freakish way in their personality that is giving a wrong impression to their fellow students. What better service could a friend render to another friend than to point out to him these impediments? To learn to know ourselves is one of the big aims of education.

After all the question of advertising yourself should not be such a big problem. It should absorb very little of the student's attention. The less of an ostentatious show you make the better for you. Don't place the emphasis upon your show window, in the way of your accomplishments. But see such articles as sincerity, earnestness, dependability and loyalty are in your window and, above all else, see that you have a good stock on hand on the "inside." Your fellow students will find out if you stack up with your advertising.
