Students earn while they learn

Dozens of Linfield College students are gaining tangible experience in the world of sports media – while boosting Linfield's sports message.

Each semester, some 15 work study students assist Kelly Bird, director of sports information, broadcasting games, taking photos, writing stories and creating video. They run scoreboards, compile statistics, broadcast games, provide office support, prepare rosters and game programs and much more.

This real-world experience, along with a new sport management minor and a unique January Term class focused on the sport industry, is preparing students for careers in sports media and administration.

According to Bird, the students who work with him enable Linfield to meet the real-time expectations of the public in this internet-driven age.

"We've come to rely on our students in so many different roles," said Bird, who noted students have made it possible to add video webcasting and same-day reports of every athletic event. "Using students, the outreach of athletic communications has expanded."

Jerry Young '14, a mass communication major with an eye on a sports broadcasting career, is in his third year working with sports information. He serves as the primary play-by-play broadcaster, calling games for volleyball, basketball and football video webcasts.

"None of it is really work for me," said Young, who grew up captivated by play-by-play announcers on TV and radio. "It's all a blast. I get to do what I loved listening

to as a kid. It's fun to experiment with phrases and find new ways to describe things."

Young spends two hours before each game researching stats and fun facts in preparation for pre- and post-game shows. "It takes a lot of work if you want to sound good on the air," said Young. "I watch it on TV with a different perspective now."

Kelsey McGarry '16, a political science major, keeps score at volleyball, basketball and softball games, and also writes feature stories and post-event recaps. "The interviewing I'm doing helps me with my people skills," said McGarry, a devoted baseball fan with aspirations of a career in local politics. "Plus, I get paid to go to sporting events."

Eric Evenson '11 spent four years working in Linfield's sports information department and is now pursuing a master's in sport management at the University of San Francisco and as an intern with the San Francisco Giants. He has also interned with the Oakland Raiders, Cal Berkeley Athletic Department and the United States Golf Association.

"For those of us working in sports, we must get used to working nontraditional hours and juggling responsibilities," he said. "Working with Kelly prepared me for high-stress environments and taught me to hold myself to a high standard even when things get busy."

This fall, Linfield instituted a new sport management minor that incorporates classes in business, philosophy, economics and other departments to provide a liberal arts view.

Courses encourage critical analysis of the culture and social significance of sport, the need for ethical and moral decision-making and the role of sport as business, according to Denise Farag '88, program coordinator and assistant professor of business.

"Having that liberal arts perspective is important," Farag said. "We've had a lot of students with an interest in athletics, but who wanted to pursue areas of sport management. This will be helpful as they prepare for careers in the sport field."

In addition to the minor, a January Term class provided an in-depth look at aspects of the sport industry. During Career Exploration: Through the Lens of Sport Management, students met with representatives from adidas, Nike, Columbia Sportswear, Portland Timbers, Portland Trail Blazers, Seattle Mariners, Seattle Seahawks and other sport-related entities. 🍀
