# ASLC forces invade Mac High, take Wortman

Details are sketchy at this point, but it has already become apparent that a paramilitary force from Linfield College has gained control of McMinnville High School's Wortman Stadium in an early Thursday morning raid.

ASLC President Chris Tjersland immediately imposed a press quarrantine upon the north half of McMinnville, centering upon the site of the invasion. Linpoon photo editor Tony "Animal" Overman, a participant in the first attack wave, was able to snap some quick photos and gather information.

Overman said more than 100 Linfield students from six Greek organizations and 20 campus residential buildings stormed the high school at 8:15 a.m. Thursday. The paramilitary force, armed with pistols, assault rifles, fire extinguishers, and California Coolers, split up into four groups after scaling the Wortman Stadium fence.

Though no casualties have been reported, the Linfield forces are reportedly meeting with some resistance near the office of the high school.

"We don't want any of your reporters getting hurt," Tjersland said when explaining the press blackout. "There's a war going on out there and it's ugly."

Tjersland denied any connection between the awarding of a USFL franchise to the college and Thursday morning's paramilitary action.

"Actually, Steve (Kordak, intramural director) needed a better IM playing field and the General Education faculty committee was serching for a more appropriate setting for core courses," Tjersland said. "The (ASLC) cabinet got to thinking and Mac High kept popping up as a site."


Tjersland added that "the deciding factor" in calling for the invasion was the peril in which student teachers were put every day by incorrigible pupils. Many of those student teachers, he continued, were Linfield students.

"Every day," Tjersland said, "they (student teachers) are in danger of being water-bombed, toilet-papered, pasted in a food fight, you name it. It was anarchy up there."

Tjersland declined to give The Linpoon an exact number of student teachers from Linfield but added, "We've been concerned about their safety for some time."

When asked what the ASLC would do with the high school, he replied, "Sell the buildings to the college but keep Wortman and lease it out to the new USFL franchise for playoff games. We've already got a packed, exciting IM schedule, since Steve (Kordak) had the presence of mind to add Willamette and PLU squads to our IM football league.

"You gotta hand it to us. We've really made a killing. Now we can pay for Eric Emery's yearbook."

# Linfield in USFL, Walker out

In a surprise announcement Thursday, the Linfield College Board of Trustees revealed the firing of President Charles U. Walker and the awarding of a United States Football League franchise to Linfield College.

J. Richard Nokes, trustee spokesman, denied allegations that the paramilitary takeover of McMinnville High School had anything to do with the new USFL contract.

Thursday, more than 100 Linfield College students in camouflage fatigues stormed McMinnville High School and at press time are reported to have control of Wortman Stadium.

Nokes said that Linfield accepted the USFL offer in a

"reciprocal agreement."

"The USFL has sagging attendance figures and can barely pay its player salaries," Nokes said. "Our addition to the league, just in time for its 1986 fall schedule, would bring excitement and greater attendance figures at relatively little cost

"We've talked to Ad (Rutschman) about this, what with all the cable TV contracts and ticket sales. Those boys deserve some kind of reward for their performance."

Nokes said that Walker, who has been Linfield's president since 1975, will be replaced by the American Tourister gorilla. No reason was given for the decision, and Nokes would only comment

off the record.

A USFL spokesman in New York said that the two NAIA Division 2 championships in three years, consistent domination of the Northwest Conference, and an intense dislike of PLU were deciding factors in awarding the franchise to Linfield.

"We're hoping to create an exciting rivalry with the Portland Breakers, but that would depend on where they (the Breakers) will be located next year," the spokesman said. The spokesman added that the league office had ordered the firing of Walker for "promotional reasons."

Walker refused to comment but wrote a note to The Linpoon informing us of his intention to become a mime.



## Faculty, administration confused over semester vote

The faculty voted 50-30 to eliminate spring semester in a special meeting convened Tuesday. The vote came after an arbitrary motion was presented by President Charles Walker.

Walker's motion advocated eliminating the current annual calendar — two semesters and a winter block — in favor of one fall semester and three blocks. The motion passed easily, after only three hours of debate.

"I believe this will make Linfield stand out among other colleges. Our calendar would offer something exciting to prospective students who have rich parents," Walker told the enthusiastic faculty.

"By having one main semester in the fall, students could get all of their studying over with by Christmas. After that, they would have the option to either attend one or more of the blocks or get a job," he said.

One other benefit a onesemester, three-block calendar would give students is the opportunity to participate in winter and spring sports without the gruesome bother of homework. In all fairness, those 200 males who make up Linfield's fall USFL football squad would be compensated for having to study more during the fall by receiving automatic pass grades in all their classes.

"By doing that," Walker said, "Linfield will continue to attract its favorite student element, the burly but brite footballers."

Opposition to the president's motion came from the five academic divisions and all of the academic departments.

A spokesman for the nursing division said, "I'm really not sure what was going on. One minute we were talking about Hindu requirements in the GEC ... and the next, the president just stood up and said he wanted to get rid of spring semester. It's really odd."

A spokesman from the education division concurred.

"We voted to drop the spring semester?" he said. "I thought we voted to make Hindu Studies part of the GEC. Are you sure the president knows parliamentary procedure?"

A science division spokesman said, "Well, we're opposed to dropping spring semester, but we voted to do it because three winter blocks sounded kind of nice. I don't think the president knows parliamentary procedure, though. I wish someone here did"

Debate on whether or not to drop the semester lasted three hours. Afterward, Ken Goodrich, vice president for academic affairs, said that most of this time was spent trying to figure out what was going on.

Linfield College, proudly or not, will host the Third Annual Pocket Pool Tournament of Champions on May 21 (Dead Day) in the Riley Fireside
